D. Social Assessment

1.1 Project Beneficiaries

The direct beneficiaries of the proposed project who took about 92% of the total population's share are mostly farmers who earned an average daily income of one hundred fifty pesos (Php150.00). Other beneficiaries are professionals who are working either in government and private establishments at the town proper and students who are attending classes at the town center. Also, about 2% of the total population of women who engage in income generating activities such as vending vegetables and snack items at the town proper will directly benefit the project.

Except on students who are only represented by the Sangguniang Kabataan (SK) Chairman, the abovementioned group of direct beneficiaries are mostly part of the consultation process especially in coming up with the Barangay Development Plans (BDP) and in formulating the Barangay Annual Development Plans (ADP). It was observed that in every consultation conducted, priority in the list of projects identified was the rehabilitation/repair of this proposed Subproject. In fact, during the conduct of the Participatory Rapid Appraisal, the people voluntarily facilitated the distribution and filling up of the basic information sheets to expedite the process of the activity. Noted to have been identified priority, aside from being identified explicitly in the Barangay Development Plan, a special consultation was conducted last February 2012 attended by 193 individuals especially the affected groups such as farmers who owned or till the land along or near the road.

Women who are the direct stewards and keeper of children's health and household cleanliness and sanitation always have the burden of efficient access to medical and social services especially that medicines and health attendants are not readily available in barangay health centers. They need to go to the town proper to avail proper medical services. This is also a big burden to all pregnant and lactating mothers. With this, almost half of the women participants strongly expressed that repair of the road will be done in the soonest possible time for them to be able to access social services at the town proper.

Women also expressed willingness to undergo on trainings that will ultimately provide them technologies for gainful self-employment activities such as mat weaving, bamboo craft production, food processing and others. Accordingly, if the road will be rehabilitated, technical persons that could provide them with technologies could efficiently deliver the necessary services for such purpose. With this, the project would help utilize their idle time on productive endeavours.

They further expressed that if the proposed road will be improved, they could help their spouses by doing the marketing of agricultural products alone due to ease in transportation.

1.2 Indigenous Cultural Community/Indigenous Peoples (ICC/IP)

Barangays Buenavista, Bagong Silang, Mahayahay and Tiacongan are not identified as Indigenous communities as well as Ancestral Domain communities/areas. This has been proven in results of the surveys conducted by organizations, groups and agencies that were doing population surveys. Purok Leaders, also could prove their non-existence per records that they submitted to their respective Barangay Government Units every year.

During implementation of the Early Childhood Development Program (ECDP) funded by World Bank (WB), the Municipal Social and Welfare Development Officer were conducting regular monitoring on the presence of IP's but based on their reports, IPs were not existent in the aforementioned areas.

To further support their non-existence, a Certificate of Non-Overlap (CNO) (hereto attached) need to be secured from the National Commission on Indigenous Peoples (NCIP). In order to attain the abovementioned certification, a Field-Based Investigation (FBI) in Barangay Mahayahay, Buenavista, Tiacongan, and Bagong Silang was conducted by the Provincial NCIP personnel to assess and validate their non-existence. After which, their field validation report is then forwarded to the Regional Review Team (RRT) of the NCIP for review purposes. Once approved, the CNO will then be issued by the NCIP.

1) Site and Right-of-Way acquisition

The proposed Subproject has been identified as Barangay Road hence, no one is allowed to construct or establish houses within the road right of way (ROW).

As of the present time, the width of the existing road to be rehabilitated is estimated to be in the 5-meter range while those for construction segments has a road width able to accommodate only the human and animal track. Once the proposed road will be implemented, there will be an expansion in the right-of-way to at least 10 meters which includes the 5-meter concrete pavement, 1.5-m shouldering each on both sides, and 1-meter length intended for the drainage canal for each side of the proposed road. Details of the list of PAPs to be affected by the right-of-way issues which presents their total landholdings and total area to be acquired from them especially in Barangay Buenavista, Mahayahay, and Tiacongan are presented in Tables 10,11, and 12, respectively.

Even in road segments with a total road length of 9,413 meters that is identified for construction particularly in segments found in barangays Mahayahay, portion in barangays Buenavista to Tiacongan, houses could not be found within the Right of Way. This road segments were impassable to vehicles because these have not been maintained due to limited funds until gradually in bad shape and impassable for more than a decade. However, during project construction, people who are regularly utilizing the road will be temporarily experiencing dust emissions but mitigations are already prepared to minimize its impact to the people.

With regards to the areas adjacent to the proposed farm-to-market road,

there are also built-up areas fronting the road where residential houses and other essential structures in the barangay such as barangay hall, and school buildings that were established.

2) Damage to standing crops, houses and/or properties

Due to the underdeveloped barangay road in the past, farmers often utilize the area by planting trees on it particularly the coconut and crops like the corn. However, upon the implementation of the project, the trees and crops they have planted will eventually be displaced. Accordingly, no compensation of the damaged crops will occur in areas identified as a barangay road while those with the private lands signed a waiver waiving their rights from their damaged crops and properties to be displaced, thus, no corresponding compensation will also be issued. With regards to the owners where a portion of their land will be affected in the implementation of the project, waiver of rights and deed of donation were executed, thus, waiving their rights for their respective affected properties in consideration for the benefit of the majority. Inventory of damaged crops and properties are presenting in the following tables:

The local government, on the other hand, will make sure that relocation sites of these houses will not be in a place which will cause hazard to the tenants' household in the future. 4) Economic displacement of persons

The proposed project will not eventually result in the loss of livelihood of the farmers. Instead, it will enhance their access towards their traditional livelihood sources. They might be able to loss a very small portion of their livelihood sources but this will bring them a significant ease in the future considering that they will now be able to benefit an easy access of their products to the market, thus increasing their livelihood income.

E. Environmental Consideration

7.1 Current Environmental Condition

The proposed road is not situated inside a protected natural habitat because it will traverse in agricultural production areas planted with rice, coconuts, corn, banana, vegetables and other

commercial species. Natural grown trees no longer thrive in the area and wildlife animals are already extinct, only domesticated animals are found in the proposed project areas.

Barangays Tiacongan, Buenavista and Mahayahay are considered upland barangays but vast portion of its land area are plain where farmers cultivated rice as one of their prime products produced.

No major rivers found in the project areas, only creeks and tributaries are present that are utilized by the people for agriculture and for domestic use.

However, environmental degradation threatened the project areas due to rampant charcoal making caused by the people who have no other recourse in order to raise income. This is one of the main reasons that trees are insignificant compared to shrubs and bushes.

7.2 Physical Cultural Resources

The proposed project site is a rural zone where vast portions of its land area are utilized and cultivated for agricultural production. Therefore, the subproject will not displace, disfigure or render inoperable/inaccessible any monument or physical structure of known cultural and historical significance.

7.3 Terrain, Soil Types and Rainfall

a) Terrain

From Table 2 Land Area by Slope Category, terrain of the municipality of Kapatagan is categorized into six. Derived from the Soil Map of the municipality of Kapatagan, both Barangay BagongSilang and Mahayahay are categorized under 0-3% which are classified as plain to gently sloping while Barangay Buenavista and Tiacongan are under 3-8% which are defined as level to very gently sloping.

b) Soil Types

There are two (2) types of soil existing in the project area, namely: silt loam and clay loam. Greater portions are of silt loam type covering an area of about 3,684.63hectares whileclay loam covers an area of800.12hectares (refer to Table 10).

Loam is soil composed of sand, silt, and clay in relatively even concentration (about 40-40-20% concentration respectively). Loam is found in a majority of successful farms in

soft and crumbly and is easy to work over a wide range of moisture condition.

Silt soil is made up of fine particles. Like clay, the soil holds water. Silt particles are very small and can compact easily. Silt loam soils generally contain high levels of silt with some measure of sand and clay. Heavily silty soils will benefit from amendments to improve drainage, aeration and overall soil structure.

Clay loam soil is soil that has up to 25% clay, 30 to 50% silt, and the rest sand. Clay soil particles are very small and compact.

c) Climate/Rainfall

The municipality has a tropical climate. Dry season starts during the month of October and ends in June. Wet season starts in the month of July and ends in December. Areas within the proposed project site do not experience heavy rainfall since the municipality of Kapatagan is not a typhoon-prone area.

7.4 Drainage Situations and Flooding Potential

Loam offers good drainage. Silt loam soils generally contain high levels of silt with some measure of sand and clay. Heavily silty soils will benefit from amendments to improve drainage, aeration and overall soil structure.

Areas within the proposed project site are not considered as flood-prone areas since it does not lie within the coastal area. It is not also susceptible to landslide since the terrain of the project site is classified as level to very gently sloping.

However, drainage structures are necessary to be established to ensure sustainability of the road project considering the global impact of climate change. Slope protection works are also vital especially in areas where the proposed road will traverse rice fields. This is undertaken to guarantee the stability of the proposed road on its sides since these are swampy areas originally.

7.5 Status of Environmental Clearances

Several environmental clearances are necessary to be secured prior to the implementation of the proposed project to make sure it won't cause great damage to the environment. The Environmental Compliance Certificate is a document issued by the DENR/EMB after a positive review of an ECC application, certifying that based on the representation of the proponent, the proposed project or undertaking will not cause significant negative environmental impact. The ECC also certifies that the proponent has complied with all the requirements of the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) System and has committed to implement its approved Environmental Management Plan. The ECC contains specific measures and conditions that the project proponent has to undertake before and during the operation of a project, and in some cases, during the project's abandonment phase to mitigate identified environmental impacts.

A Tree Cutting Permit is also necessary before the implementation of the project. Permit to cut coconut trees will be issued by the Philippine Coconut Authority after following the procedures required by the PCA along with the necessary measures to follow after the cutting of the trees which is the tree-planting and tree-growing scheme so as to sustain the coconut resources in the environment. Same thing applies to the Tree Cutting Permit of fruit-bearing trees which will be issued by the DENR after compliance of several requirements which in return, the proponent must also comply with the replacement of the number of trees being cut so as to preserve the environment especially in response to the global issue of climate change in which one of the reasons contributing to such global condition is due to the degradation of our forest resources.

Permit to quarry is another necessary environmental clearance that needs to be secured by identified quarry sources. The Provincial Environment and Natural Resources Office (PENRO) is responsible for the assessment of the site and issuance of Permit to Quarry will be issued by the DENR to the operator of the quarry sites. The Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) approves the required aggregates sourced from the quarry sites and has a list of the DPWH accredited resources from certain quarry sites.

A disposal site for unsuitable excavated materials is also an essential thing to consider. As for the proposed project, the proponent attached herewith the certification on how and who will utilize the unsuitable excavated materials in the project site.

7.6 Impacts during Construction

Definitely, there will be no adverse impacts to the environment once the project started since this proposed site is not entirely a new project. However, on portions that are no longer passable by four-wheeled vehicles or that requires construction during project implementation it is possible that there will be clight impacts. to the

environment. However, in cases of accidental damages to plants, assessment shall be conducted by the barangay official and shall be validated by the Department of Agriculture to check the accuracy of information and to determine how it will be compensated.

To be specific, the following are the expected slight environmental damages and the corresponding mitigating measures that will be applied:

- a) Temporary Erosion and Sediment Control
 - > Soil Erosion Temporary sedimentation of natural drainage ways, concentrated outflows from drains

Mitigating measures:

- Careful planning of cut & fill of earth surface
- Placement of adequate drain outlets and turn outs.
- Lining of receiving surface of outflow drains stones and/or concrete
- Re use of cut soil for backfilling and other land leveling Activities
- Seeding and planting of erodible surfaces
 - ➤ Siltation Stock files of soil and rock could be eroded during heavy rains and silt up creeks and streams.

Mitigating measures:

- Susceptible soil surfaces should be protected with sandbags at segments near waterways to serve as soil barriers.
- b) Construction Noise Mitigation
 - Noise- Short-term in nature, noise generation may be at its peak during certain phases.

Mitigating measures:

- Intermittent use of heavy equipment;
- Set up speed limit for vehicles, especially within residential areas
- c) Proper Handling of Construction Wastes
 - > Improper disposal of construction waste materials, workers garbage and construction toilet.

Mitigating measures:

- Efficient housekeeping practices
- Proper collection and disposal of waste
- d) Safety
- Accidents to Workers potentially involve work-related hazards such as falling, tripping, and slippages that may result to injuries and even loss of life.

Mitigating measures:

Sealing-off of construction site;





